



## How to fix a swingline stapler 664xx

How do you take apart a stapler? Why is my stapler? Why is my stapler? What is the best heavy duty stapler? A paper clip is the perfect size for picking at a jammed stapler. The method is the same as above, using the loop of the paperclip to try to loosen the jammed staple up so it falls out of the magazine. You can also try to pick out the jammed staple with the point of the paperclip, gliding it out. Handy in many ways! (Difficulty = 7, needed strength & small Phillips screwdriver) Slide metal component. (Difficulty = 1) Remove the metal component from the base, removing the hinging metal component and remove the slide and the slide spring (Difficulty = 2) Use a small flathead screwdriver to remove the interior bottom slide housing from the bottom slide housing. (Difficulty = 3)Pop interior bottom slide housing, making sure to include the interior spring. Then, attach slide to bottom slide housing. (Difficulty = 7)Place metal component (with top slide housing hinge aligned with bottom slide housing hinge aligned) and plastic cover. Then, place top spring in slot of plastic cover, and push plastic cover onto the metal axle running through the metal component and base. (Difficulty = 8, must use a lot of strength to pop the top back onto the axle) If you use staplers long enough, you'll probably end up jamming one. The more often you have to try and fix a jammed stapler, the more likely you are to experience the dreaded pricked fingertip. Following a few tried-and-true methods, you can successfully remove a stuck staple from a stapler and get back to work. Staples are pressed together in a long row, and after each press of the stapler, one drop downs into the correct position for the next use. Occasionally, staples fall in an awkward position and jam. If you pound the stapler too hard, or if you're trying to staple too many pages, you can bend one of the tines of the staple further isn't working might be to bang it on the desk or table, hoping to get the jammed staple to fall out. Don't do this. You can jam the staple further in and make it more difficult to remove. The same goes for repeatedly trying to staple something. The base of the stapler often matches the color of the magazine lid. Trying to raise the lid of the magazine while holding the bottom of it can cause you to flip the lid too quickly. Hold the top of the stapler magazine with two fingers and slowly, while maintaining firm pressure, start pulling the lid apart from the part of the magazine that holds the staple. Be careful not to do this too quickly, or the lid might again fly open, spraying the staples all over your office or desk. Some staplers have a mechanism that looks like a button. Press this to open the magazine lid. If you can't open the lid of the magazine, try to see if a stapler has jammed near the front. You might see the two tines of a staple sticking out of the bottom front of the stapler, indicating a jam has occurred. Use scissors, a small pair of pliers, or even your fingers to pull the staple out. Once you have the lid open, look to see what the problem is. You might see staples misaligned, preventing any from falling downward. You might see that a staple has fallen down into stapling position, but it's now bent or jammed. Pull the spring mechanism (that pushes the staples, either with your fingers or by turning the stapler upside down and letting them fall out, recommends tool review website Cool Circuit. Turn the magazine upside down and gently tap it on your desk to see if the problem staple falls out. If it does, turn the stapler over, make sure the remaining staples are loaded correctly (which means all against each other with no gaps) toward the front of the stapler. If this doesn't work, try unbending a paper clip and prying the problem stapler out. Try to lift the staple up from the top of the magazine. Some lightweight staplers will jam easily if you try to staple more than 10 pages or try to staple thick paper or cardboard. If your office doesn't have a small, lightweight stapler and a heavy duty one, consider getting one of each. You might invest in a staple gun if you'll be stapling boxes or packages, such as padded mailers. The easiest way to avoid jams is to quickly open the stapler lid and check to make sure the staples are lined up properly, all together, and that the first staple isn't misaligned, ready to jam. Chosen Solution Eric Fields , I assume you are asking about the long thin feed/load spring which usually connects to a small tab on the staplers upper slide housing and to a tab on the slide.
